


SFCC EXPENSES - \$28,797,494











SFCC General Fund - Revenue By Percent

CENTER FOR EXCELLENCE FOR

Advanced Manufacturing

The Center for Excellence in Advanced Manufacturing is a collaborative space where key stakeholders from business and industry work with the college to advance student training programs, balance educational values and where students and existing workforce can access employment opportunities in the world of advanced manufacturing. Operations are systematic, sustainable and can be repeated or duplicated designed to transform the regional economy through technical education.

SFCC offers manufacturing education and training programs for high-demand and high-paying careers, such as machinists, welders, maintenance technicians and more. These programs include short-term skills and professional certificates that lead to associate degrees. Many of our stents leave SFCC with multiple job offers and salaries starting at more than \$50,000 a year.

To meet the critical workforce training need in SFCC's service region, the college opened the 38,5000 square-foot Olen Howard Workforce Innovation Center. The Howard Center expanded lab and classroom space for welding, pre-apprenticeships, precision machining and workforce training along with leadership, supervisory and logistics skill building. The renovated Fielding Technical Center expanded lab and classroom space for industrial electrical maintenance, robotics, and HVAC programs providing additional training and education for students and industry.

The Center for Advanced Agriculture & Transportation Technology will be adjacent to the new 200-acre farm.

The new farm will include livestock and row crop operations to enhance education for degree-seeking students, agribusinesses, agricultural producers, and the general public. The livestock portion of the farm will feature small ruminants integrated into a cow/calf operation and will demonstrate a variety of breeding techniques, pasture management and grazing practices, and herd management options.

The \$20 million center will expand training programs and certifications in agriculture, including ag mechanics, precision agriculture, transportation logistics, diesel technology, ASE accredited automotive technology, alternative/future fuels and material handling equipment/technologies.

The total project likely will require a \$30 million investment. The State of Missouri has committed \$12.5 million and the SFCC Foundation has committed to raising \$10 million private funds for the CAATT building.





Fine and Performing Arts

The Center for Excellence for Fine and Performing Arts provides students, the local communities, and the central Missouri region with engaging experiences through art, theater, and music education and programming. Fine Arts program is a foundations program for visual art students. Drawing, design, figure drawing, painting, ceramics, sculpture, art history, watercolor, printmaking, and fibers make up the core of the art classes. The theater program provides professional-quality instruction and productions in outstanding facilities where three fulllength plays, a children's show, and student-directed one-act plays are performed annually. Music program teaches music theory, history, and opportunities to perform in vocal or instrumental ensembles. The program includes performance opportunities with two vocal ensembles. Chamber Choir and Jazz Choir. and the Jazz Runners instrumental ensemble. These programs provide an enriched environment conducive to the development of individual understanding and basic literacy in the fine and performing arts disciplines through curricular and co-curricular arts education designed to meet the needs of the general college student, the arts major, the general public, and the professional artist.

Another exciting aspect of studying art at SFCC is exploring the programs and collections of **Daum Museum of Contemporary Art** on the Sedalia campus. The museum presents changing exhibitions plus selected works from its permanent collection, which is comprised of abstract paintings, drawings, prints, works in clay, and sculpture created since the mid-20th century by many of America's most celebrated artists. Art instructors incorporate the exhibitions into curriculum.

The Kemper Military School, was the oldest military academy west of the Mississippi River and served the community from 1844 - 2002. In 2012, the city of Boonville asked SFCC to offer classes on the campus, and SFCC-Boonville opened in August 2012.

The campus is owned by the City of Boonville and is used in different parts for the Boonslick Heartland YMCA, State Fair Community College, and for many local events and festivities, as well as soccer and baseball fields for local youth sports. 



Total Students Enrolled (2022-2023)



Unlike in some states, Missouri's community colleges are not a "system" with a centralized administration under one governing body. Rather, our institutions are 12 separate and independent local colleges with a history of working together to meet both state and local needs.

In 1993, MCCA recommended to the Coordinating Board of Higher Education that Missouri be divided into community college service regions covering the entire state. As local entities, each college's academic and workforce training programs mirror the local economy by design – a network that allows community colleges to serve every Missouri citizen and every Missouri business.

As a representative body, MCCA works to build and strengthen relationships with state legislators and serve as a ready resource for policymakers on questions related to higher education and workforce training. Missouri's community college service regions cover the entire state, allowing us to serve every Missourian and every Missouri business.
