From the SFCC President

In the 1980s (yes, I am an old man), there was a popular television show, "The A-Team," and the leader of the A team, Hannibal Smith used to say, "I love it when a plan comes together."

It has been an incredibly busy year at State Fair Community College and a lot of great things happened. Enrollment was up. Our athletic teams had success. Our foundation successfully completed the largest capital campaign in the college's history. We had two large commencements and two great graduations for our Adult Education and Literacy programs.

At the end of the summer, we had the grand opening celebration for two new buildings on our Sedalia campus west side, the Ellebracht Agriculture and Mechanics and the Campus Housing Complex. That same week the Board of Trustees approved the construction of a new outdoor athletic facility.

The Ellebracht Building provides upgrade and expansion for our Automotive Technology program, adding programming for alternative fueled vehicles and diesel technology. It also provides expansion opportunities in our Agriculture program, allowing us to expand into the important areas of Agriculture Technology and Precision Agriculture. The Campus Housing Complex is a 196-bed residential facility, featuring suite-style rooms and spaces for student engagement. Both these facilities represent a significant investment in housing and training the next generation of talent to meet the future workforce needs of our region.

The construction of the outdoor athletic complex will provide an on-campus competitive home for several of our



sports and will feature turf fields for baseball, softball and soccer, along with new track and field complex.

While all that and more was incredibly exciting, most of it would not have happened if not for planning. All of that caused me to think of Hannibal Smith and the A-Team. "I love it when a plan comes together."

So as we celebrated our plans coming together, we are now making new plans for our future. Our new Strategic Plan, Connecting College and Community: SFCC's Plan for Becoming the Nexus of Education and Community, has just been finalized. The planning process included envisioning the future of State Fair Community College, and it involved a planning team with input from students, faculty and staff and more than 100 community members. From this process came four Transformational Concepts:

-) Community Hub: SFCC serves as a source of solutions, opportunities and community enrichment for communities throughout our service region.
-) K-12 Relationships: SFCC connects with every high school student in the region, creating a seamless transition to college and a career.
-) Work, Learn, Thrive: SFCC students enter the job field equipped with the technical and essential workplace skills employers seek.
-) Comprehensive Support for Students: Core supports and academic flexibility make it possible for more students to access college and achieve success.

Teams are now working on strategies to accomplish each of these transformational concepts.

In addition to the Strategic Plan, the college is in the final stages of development of the Campus Master Plan, which will guide our building and grounds development on the Sedalia campus. This Master Plan will be submitted to the Board of Trustees for approval later in the fall semester.

With these two plans in place, the Strategic Plan and the Campus Master Plan, SFCC and its own "A Teams" will identify new opportunities to serve our communities and our students. And then again, I expect we will be saying,
















Molly Prichard

Then she first arrived at SFCC, Gracen was nervous and didn't know what to expect. She sat in the back of the classroom and was hesitant to speak up. However, over time, and with the support of her instructors and peers, she found her voice.

"Honestly, I wouldn't be where I am today without the professors at SFCC, Deanna Barklage, and all of my classmates who helped drive me, pushed me through, and encouraged me to do my best." Gracen said.

Gracen chose SFCC because it was affordable, close to home and offered quality education. It was the Behavioral Health Support program, however, that truly caught her attention.

"SFCC really opened up pathways for me and gave me a ton of options and things I never would have known about without some of the professors," Gracen stated.

During her time at SFCC, Gracen served as president of the Active Minds chapter, promoting mental health awareness on campus, and was an active member of the TRiO Student Organization. She also contributed to the Campus Issue Resolution Committee (CIRC) and earned first-generation academic honors.

For Kyle Weymuth, the road to success has always been rooted in community, family and integrity. A proud alumnus of State Fair Community College and a respected business leader in Central Missouri, Weymuth was named the 2025 recipient of SFCC's Distinguished Alumni Award. He was also honored to serve as the keynote speaker for the college's spring commencement ceremony on May 16.

s the fourth-generation owner and Dealer Principal of the W-K Family of Dealerships, Weymuth has carried forward a legacy that began over a century ago. Founded in 1919 by his great-grandfather, the family business started as W-K Chevrolet and has since grown to serve a broader region under Kyle's stewardship. Today, Weymuth, alongside his brothers, ensures that the company remains not just a fixture of local commerce but also a cornerstone of community support.

"My earliest memories are of washing cars at the dealership during summer breaks," Weymuth said during his commencement address. "Those experiences taught me the value of hard work and the importance of relationships."

Raised in Cole Camp and a graduate of Benton County R1, Weymuth embodies the values of small-town Missouri. He enrolled at SFCC after high school, drawn by its strong academic programs, supportive community, and the chance to play basketball as a Roadrunner. He graduated in 2006 with his associate degree before earning a bachelor's degree from the University of Central Missouri in 2008.

Weymuth credits SFCC as a pivotal stepping stone in both his personal and professional journey.

"State Fair was more than just a college to me," he said. "It was a place that helped me grow into who I am today. It gave me a sense of direction, a sense of belonging—and friendships that have lasted a lifetime."

His commitment to giving back mirrors the opportunities he once received. Weymuth serves on multiple boards, including the Missouri Auto Dealers Association Executive Committee, the Sedalia Economic Development Board, and the SFCC Foundation Board, where he currently serves as treasurer. He is also a past member of the Boonville Chamber of Commerce.

Beyond his professional duties, Weymuth is a passionate advocate for local causes. Through the W-K Family of Dealerships, he supports a wide range of charitable initiatives, including the Boys and Girls Club of West Central Missouri and various regional nonprofit organizations.

"Being part of a family business means being part of something bigger than yourself," he said. "We're not just selling vehicles—we're building relationships. We have a responsibility to our customers, our employees and our community."

That sense of responsibility extends into every facet of Weymuth's life. At home, he is a devoted husband to his wife, Kelli, and a proud father to their two children, Kellen and Klara Jo. Whether coaching Kellen's basketball team or cheering on Klara Jo from the sidelines, Weymuth prioritizes family above all.

"My kids are my greatest joy," he said. "Being a dad is the most important role I'll ever have."

As commencement speaker, Weymuth shared heartfelt advice with SFCC's newest graduates. He encouraged them to pursue their passions, stay connected to their roots, and never underestimate the power of perseverance.

"Success doesn't happen overnight," he told the class of 2025. "It's built on long days, strong values, and the people who believe in you."

For SFCC, honoring Kyle Weymuth as this year's Distinguished Alumni is more than a recognition of professional success—it's a celebration of leadership, service and unwavering dedication to community. Through his words and actions, Weymuth continues to inspire others to lead with integrity, give generously and stay true to the place they call home.



DOUG FREED RECEIVES AWARD OF DISTINCTION AT THE 2024 ANNUAL MCCA CONFERENCE.



Freed's works have been featured in New York City, Boston, Miami, Chicago, San Francisco, Houston, Charleston, St. Louis and Kansas City. Association (MCCA) held its annual conference in Branson last November, where Doug Freed received the Award of Distinction from his nomination by State Fair Community College. The award is presented to individuals who have demonstrated sustained service and commitment to their local community college. It is one of the highest honors MCCA bestows.

"As a talented artist, as a charter art faculty member, and as the founding director of the Daum Museum of Contemporary Art, Douglas Freed has had a tremendous impact not only on State Fair Community College, our students and the communities we serve but also on the State of Missouri," said College President Brent Bates. "He is an impactful artist and teacher, and we are so proud that he was honored by the Missouri Community College Association with the Award of Distinction."

Freed's 40-year tenure at SFCC began Aug. 1, 1968, as the one-man Art program in the original structure of the college, affectionately nicknamed Plywood U. He served as chairman of the Art program for many years and watched his program reach one pinnacle after another—the opening of the Goddard Gallery in 1995, followed by the opening of the Daum Museum of Contemporary Art in 2002. Freed served as the Director of the Daum Museum of Contemporary Art at State Fair Community College until his retirement in February 2008.

Freed was the principal advisor to Dr. Harold Daum, a local radiologist, in assembling his collection of contemporary art. Freed helped build the Daum Museum collection from 200 objects to over 800 since its opening. He served as curator for over 50 exhibitions, several of which toured other museums. Freed has stayed active in his community and has served on several boards, including two terms as president of the Sedalia Arts Council of which he is a founding member.

An established prolific artist himself, Freed's works have been featured in New York City, Boston, Miami, Chicago, San Francisco, Houston, Charleston, St. Louis and Kansas City. He has had over sixty solo exhibitions. His work is in the Missouri museum collections of the Daum Museum of Contemporary Art in Sedalia, St. Louis Art Museum, Kemper Museum of Contemporary Art in Kansas City, Mildred Kemper Museum of Art in St. Louis, Springfield Museum of Art, and the Museum of Art and Archeology at the University of Missouri in Columbia.

Crooks posted a .373 batting average while playing in 50 games. She hit three home runs, drove in 14 runs, scored 36 times, and stole 16 bases.

Haselhorst batted .309 in 46 games. She hit seven home runs, tallied 29 RBIs, scored 29 runs, and stole seven bases.

ROADRUNNERS BASEBALL EARNS **POSTSEASON ACCOLADES**

ight members of the State Fair Community College baseball team have earned postseason honors for their performances. Awards were determined by votes from coaches in Region 16 and the Missouri Community College Athletic Conference. The Roadrunners finished their campaign with a 32-17 record and made an appearance in the Region 16 Tournament.

Sophomore outfielder Devin Wassmann, of Platte City, was named First Team All-Region 16 as a designated hitter. Sophomore pitcher Nate Bartlett, of Lee's Summit, earned First Team All-Region honors as a starting pitcher. Freshman outfielder and pitcher Collin Ross, of Branson, was selected to the Second Team as an outfielder, while freshman pitcher Jacob Tellman, of Jefferson City, joined him on the Second Team as a starting pitcher.

In addition to their All-Region accolades, several Roadrunners were recognized by the Missouri Community College Athletic Conference. Bartlett was named to the All-Conference First Team, while Wassmann, Ross and Tellman were selected to the Second Team along with sophomore outfielder and first baseman Dayne Wimberly, of Platte City, sophomore pitcher Parker Lambeth, of Springfield, and sophomore outfielder Caleb Briggs, of Lee's Summit.

Two players also received recognition for their defensive efforts. Sophomore middle infielder Sam Paule, of Washington, was named to the Region 16 Division I Baseball All-Defensive Team as a second baseman. Ross received the same defensive honor as an outfielder.

Wassmann played in 45 games this season, finishing with a .292 batting average. He hit 11 home runs, drove in 41 runs, scored 35 times, stole six bases, and totaled 40 hits. Bartlett made 12 appearances, including 10 starts, and compiled a 5-1 record. He pitched more than 60 innings striking out 92 batters, walking 30 and posting a 3.00 ERA.

Ross batted .351 in 47 games during his freshman campaign. He recorded 52 hits, including eight doubles, four triples and two home runs. He also tallied 36 RBIs. 30 runs scored and nine stolen bases. Tellman appeared in 13 games, 11 of which were starts, and earned a 4-4 record. He finished the season with a 3.88 ERA over 58 innings, striking out 75 and walking 24.

Wimberly played in 43 games, recording a .313 batting average. He hit nine home runs, drove in 41 runs, scored 35, stole three bases, and contributed 46 hits. Lambeth made 17 appearances out of the bullpen and was a key component of SFCC's relief corps. He went 6-1 with four saves, a 2.36 ERA, and 36 strikeouts in 34 1/3 innings pitched.

Briggs played in 49 games and was a consistent presence in the outfield. He posted a .318 batting average with 54 hits, three home runs, 32 RBIs, 55 runs scored and 17 stolen bases.

These postseason honors highlight the contributions and achievements of a talented group of student-athletes who helped lead the Roadrunners through a successful 2024–25 campaign.

SFCC BRINGS HOME TWO **ALL-AMERICAN FINISHES** AT OUTDOOR TRACK & FIELD NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

The men's and women's outdoor track and field teams wrapped up their season at the NJCAA Division I Outdoor Track and Field Championships held May 15-17 at Gowans Stadium.

Sophomore Isaiah Waller from Versailles earned All-American honors in the hammer throw with a mark of 55.78 meters, earning second place. He also placed ninth in the discus with a throw of 49.30 meters. Freshman Tucker Singer earned All-American recognition, finishing fifth in the shot put with a throw of 16.60 meters.

Sophomore Jasper DeGraffenreid from Eldon finished 12th in the shot put with a mark of 14.61 meters. Freshman ZeShaun Ballance-Gray from Kansas City placed 14th in the triple jump with a leap of 14.06 meters, and freshman Demarii Williams from Rolla was 15th in the shot put at 13.99 meters. Sophomore Jess Cornick from Mason City, Iowa, ran the 800 meters in 1:55.39, finishing 28th. The Roadrunners placed 20th overall in the men's team standings with 12 points.

On the women's side, sophomore Bailey Haselhorst from Kansas City recorded the top finish for the Lady Roadrunners placing 12th in the javelin with a throw of 35.70 meters. Freshman Izzy Sabala from Hermitage placed 15th in the same event with a throw of 33.74 meters. Freshman Jocelyn Nunez from Independence placed 16th in the long jump with a mark of 5.06 meters.

"We had a nice culmination to a very successful season," said Head Coach **Brad Hagedorn**. "We have preached consistency all year, and it showed up at nationals. The athletes performed well and represented our school and team excellently. Congratulations to Isaiah and Tucker for placing in their events and earning All-American honors."


Jeremy Jackson Head Coach, Men's Basketball

Lady Roadrunners Earn Spot at Nationals



he State Fair Community College Lady Roadrunners capped one of the most successful seasons in program history with their fifth appearance in the NJCAA Division I Women's Basketball Championship. SFCC, the No. 20 seed, fell 67-49 to 13th-seeded Arizona Western College in the first round on March 25 at the Ford Wyoming Center.

SFCC earned its first national tournament appearance since 2014 by winning the Region 16 Tournament Championship, finishing the season with a 24-7 record – the program's best mark since 2010-11. Head Coach Nicole Collier was named District Coach of the Year after leading the team to its fifth straight NJCAA Academic Team Award.

In the tournament game, sophomore guard Madison Johnson of Harrisonville paced the Lady Roadrunners with 12 points, while freshman forward Shae Wright of Grandview added nine off the bench. Sophomore forward Kayla Sullivan of St. Louis pulled down 10 rebounds. Despite strong efforts, SFCC struggled offensively, shooting just 28 percent from the field.

The 2024-25 campaign continued Collier's steady rise with the program. Since arriving in 2021, she has guided SFCC from single-digit wins to consecutive 20-win seasons, while also building a strong academic tradition.




